





The programme for the day was a vibrant amalgamation of various activities like Prop Dance, Competitions between mom and child, some games like Simon Says... as the event was virtual.


All the moms played games with their kids and enjoyed them a lot. It was a great event all together.




World Read Aloud Day










Virtual Field Trips

Experiential Learning

Light travels in a straight line as long as it remains in the same medium. Due to refraction of light, when a ray of light enters from one transparent medium into another, it changes its path or bends at the boundary separating the two media. When a ray of light falls on any object (polished, smooth, shiny object), light from the object bounces back those rays of light to our eyes and this phenomenon is known as "Reflection" or "Reflection of Light". This phenomenon is what enables us to look at the world around us.

Substances that dissolve in water are said to be soluble in water. For ex. Sugar and Salt. Substances that do not dissolve in water are insoluble in water. For ex. sand and chalk powder.

With available materials at home, these experiment was conducted in a virtual session.

The purpose of this activity was not only to blend learning with fun but also to develop confidence in students by giving them opportunity to speak in front of the audience.



Students from Class 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th participated in the Hour of Code which is the largest learning event in history during Computer Science Education Week





HOC is a global movement introducing tens of millions of students worldwide to computer science, inspiring kids to learn more, breaking stereotypes, and leaving them feeling empowered.



Monarch butterfly is a species of butterflies, also known as milkweed, common tiger, wanderer, and black veined brown.

The eastern North American monarch population is notable for its annual southward late-summer/ autumn migration from the northern and central United States and southern Canada to Florida and Mexico. Eggs are laid singly on the underside of a young leaf of a milk-weed plant during the spring and summer months. The eggs are cream colored or light green. Females lay their eggs on the underside of the milkweed leaves; the offspring's consumption of the milkweed benefits health and helps defend them against predators. Eggs take 3 to 8 days to develop and hatch into larva or caterpillars. Monarchs will lay egg s along the southern migration route.

FLIGHTLESS BIRDS

Flightless birds are birds that lost the ability to fly. These birds either swim in water bodies or run about on land. Some flightless birds are:-

OSTRICH

Ostriches live on the African savannah. They are the largest, heaviest and fastest-running birds in the world. They are 2.5 m tall, weigh 150 kg and run like a racehorse at a top speed of 55 km/h. Ostriches are omnivores. They eat seeds, insects and lizards. Ostriches can live for up to 68 years. Males have black feathers while chicks, juveniles and females camouflage with brownish feathers. Ostriches have the largest eyes of any land animal and 3 eyelids! They also don't bury their heads in sand, as generally believed, but a female sitting on her eggs will press her neck on the ground to look like a rock. This camouflages her from far away predators. Males shade the eggs and chicks from the scorching heat with their plume-like feathers.

2.EMU

Emus live in Australia and New Guinea. They measure 2 m tall, about as tall as the Ostrich, 45 kg in weight and run at more than 50 km/h. They eat fruits, berries, insects, grass, flowers and seeds. Emus can live up to 10-20 years in the wild. Ones kept in captivity can live up to 35 years. Male Emus incubate eggs for 8 weeks, during which they do not eat nor drink. Emus are one of the flightless birds that migrate. They travel about 500 km on foot.

3. RHEA

Rheas live in the Pampas(grassland) in South America. Athough they are smaller than the O strich and the Emu, they are the largest birds in North, Central and South America. They are 1.5 m tall, weigh maximum 25 kg and run at 50 km/h. They mainly eat fruits, grass, seeds, insects and lizards. Their lifespan is 10.5 years. Rheas often gather in flocks of 100+ birds. They hide from predators by lying down on the ground with their head stretched out.

4 CASSOWARIES

Cassowaries live in the rainforests of Australia and New Guinea. They are about 1.5-1.8 m tall and weigh about 58.5 kg. They eat fallen fruits, small creatures, fungi, carrion and plant matter. They live up to 40-50 years. There are 3 species of Cassowary- Northern Cassowary, Southern(Double-Wattled) Cassowary and Bennet's(Dwarf) Cassowary. They all have long strong legs with sharp claws. Thet also have a crests called casques on their heads. Scientists think it helps them break their way through tangled plants in the rainforest.

5. BENNET'S CASSOWARY

This species of cassowary is 1 m tall and 18 kg in weight. It will kick anything too close to its nest with its 10 cm claws.

6. KIWI

The Kiwi is a flightles bird that is well known but seldom seen. It is 35-45 cm tall and weighs 0.8-1.9 kg. It eats worms, woodlice, myriapods(invertabrates like centipedes and millipedes), slugs, snails, spiders, insects, seeds, berries and other plant material. Kiwis are nocturnal. They hunt at night. Unlike most birds, Kiwis have a good sense of smell, they sniff out prey with the nostrils at the tip of their beaks an then, plunge their beaks into the ground to catch prey.

7. penguin

Penguins live only in Antarctica. This is because Penguins don't know how to survive with big predators of the North Pole like Polar Bears. Penguins are about 38.1-106.7 cm tall and weigh 0.9-36 kg. They are slow on land but in the water, ther can swim up to 24 km/h. They spend 3/4 of their life in water, even hunting and eating krill, squid and fish underwater. They mainly come up to land or sea ice to escape predators and breed. There are many species of penguin-Adelie, African, Chinstrap, Emperor, Erect-Crested, Fjorland, Galapagos, Gentoo, Humboldt, King, Little, Macaroni, Magellanic, Rockhopper, Royal, Snares Island and Yellow-Eyed.

8. DODO

The Dodo is an extinct species of flightless birds that was a part of the pigeon family. It lived on Mauritius Island that is near Madagascar. It was 1 m tall and weighed 10.6-17.5 kg. These birds were very intelligent and friendly. Dodos probably ate nuts, seeds and roots but experts have suggested it might have eaten crabs and shellfish like their distant cousin, the crowned pigeon. To break down these tough foods, the Dodo might have swallowed rocks called gastroliths. The Dodo became extinct because of overhunting by people and habitat loss. Also, alien species introduced to Mauritius Island by people, like cats, ate Dodo eggs. We should not let what happened to the Dodo happen to endangered animals today, who are facing the same difficulties. PROTECT ALL ANIMALS!

'Know Thy Neighbour'

"A person living next door to or very near to the speaker or person referred to " – This is the oxford meaning of the word neighbour.

"No one is rich enough to do without a neighbour"

Bhutan is one of our neighbours with whom we share boundaries. It is a small land locked country in the Himalayas, with around 750,000 people, is also known as the hidden jewel. Why is it termed as precious as a jewel? Generally, it is sais so because of the enriching scenic beauty hidden in the enormous Himalayas. Well, I have a little different take on this .For me there are multiple reasons that make Bhutan unique and valuable.

Almost 200 countries around the world are adversely affected by global warming. Most of them have to pledged to become carbon neutral by 2050 but, till date, Bhutan is the only country that is carbon neutral. In fact, Bhutan has achieved more than just being carbon neutral, it is carbon negative. The constitution of Bhutan imposes a compulsory 60% of green cover at all times of the year. Surpassing their constitutional limit, Bhutan is at 80% of green cover. These facts are definitely very strong and apt reasons to name Bhutan as a precious jewel.

Such commendable level of achievement is definitely impossible without a good and just governance and awareness. The people of Bhutan, love their kings and believe in their kings. Bhutan has a democratic constitutional monarchy, where the king is the head of the state and the executive power is vested in the cabinet. This democracy was never asked by the people but imposed by the kings. The Constitution mandates all the kings to retire at the age of 65, proves the governance to be benevolent. 
Science department of Yakult Danone India Pvt. Ltd conducted a health workshop for EIS students on Digestive System and Gut Health through a virtual zoom meeting.





ter, food, money, clothes or occupation - for centuries, the women have had little or no say in what they need and desire. All around the world, gender bias and inequality is deep-rooted. Dress codes: The concept of dress code is quite necessary at institu-tions. What irks me and I am sure many girls around the world, is that dress codes are stricter and more restrictive for us. girls, than for the boys.

The changes we now see towards women's empower ment are to be welcomed, but definitely not significant enough. Instead of imposing restrictions on females for their safe-ty, we can start teaching our men and boys to respect a female's safety and personal space. Why can't we teach everyone to respect how we choose to dress or speak for

Whether at school or elsewhee, we must stop assuming that women are weak, insufficient and incompetent. Men and women can bring this change by teaching children mutual-respect instead of dominance, acceptance instead of neg-lect and equality instead of discrimination. 


